Purpose and objectives of discipline	The main purpose of the discipline is to form students' philosophical thinking; provide theoretical and applied features of philosophical knowledge; interpret the history of philosophical thought, the world system and the processes of globalization; explain the processes in modern society and its main areas. Course objectives: - learn the features of the philosophy;
	- determine the main stages of the history of the development of philosophical science and analyze theoretical orientations and concepts;
	- consider the features of the methodology of modern philosophical knowledge;
	- analyze the process of knowledge from the point of view of modern methodology of science and study the specifics of social knowledge;
	- study the main spheres of society and their interrelation with regard to their current state.
Course description	This course is a survey of several major areas of Western analytic philosophy: metaphysics and epistemology, ethics, philosophy of mind, philosophy of language, philosophy of

Prerequisites	religion, and philosophy of science. Students explore such concepts as the nature of the knowledge; moral behavior and the nature of good and evil; the relationship between minds and bodies; the relationship between our thoughts and the external world; arguments for and against the existence of God; and how we should employ logical analysis and empirical observations to evaluate arguments. The student should be familiar with such disciplines as "Logic", "World History", "Ethics"
Postrequisites	Basic knowledge and skills that a student must master as a result of studying the discipline: - understanding the role of the philosophy in the history of science; - know the main stages of the philosophical thought development;
	 master the skills of philosophical analysis and be able to use them in their future professional activities; be able to justify ideological and civil position; have an idea about the features of modern civilization and global processes in the modern world.

Know the basic laws of the development of society, the laws and stages of the philosophical process, the essence of citizenship.

Be able to navigate the historic-philosophical and sociophilosophical process, to analyze processes and phenomena occurring in society, to participate in civil life, based on knowledge of social and political concepts and structures of readiness for active and democratic participation.

Own the skills of a holistic approach to the analysis of society's problems, the skills of collecting systematization and independent analysis of information about socio-political and economic processes and readiness for active and democratic participation.
